## The Briscoes and Service to Ireland

It was a trivia question. Who were the father and son Lord Mayors of Dublin in the 20th Century? Bonus question: What set them apart from other Lord Mayors of the capital city? Additional bonus question: What legislative achievement did they accomplish?

The answer is Robert and Ben Briscoe. What set them apart was the fact that they are Jewish. They were also the longest serving family in the Irish Dail.

Robert Briscoe was born to Lithuanian Jewish immigrants to Ireland in 1894. He joined the Irish Republican Army, ran guns and ammunition for the IRA, and later raised money to help bring Jews to Palestine. He also served as a member of the Dail, the Irish parliament, from 1927 to 1965. He was befriended by Eamon de Valera, and was one of the Sinn Fein representatives who traveled to the United States to raise funds for the group and the cause. He spoke for the Sinn Féin cause at public meetings and was adamant that being a "Hebrew" did not lessen his being an Irishman. Robert Briscoe was sent by Michael Collins to Germany in 1919 to be the chief agent for procuring arms for the IRA

Starting in 1927, Briscoe served in the Dail, the Irish parliament, serving the South Dublin district for the Fianna Fáil party. Redistricting in 1948 created the Southwest Dublin district, and Briscoe was elected until his retirement in 1965, serving as Teachta Dála (TD) in the Oireachtas for thirty-eight years. In 1956, Briscoe became the first Jewish Lord Mayor of Dublin, a largely ceremonial post. He was re-elected in 1961. He decided not to run for reelection in 1965, and was succeeded by his son, Ben.

Ben Briscoe served in his father's seat in Southwest Dublin for Fianna Fail, starting in 1965. Later, he would serve Dublin South Central, and when the district was realigned again, he served Dublin Rathmines West, until that district was eliminated and he

Dublin Rathmines West, until that district was eliminated and he served South Central again. In 1988, he was elected Lord Mayor of Dublin, thus becoming the first, and only, father-son duo for that office in the 20th century. In 1992, Ben was involved in a protracted election recount with the Democratic Left candidate, Eric Byrne, which Briscoe had originally lost. The recount took ten days, and Briscoe was to say it was a case of “the agony and the ex-TD.” Ben would retire in 2002. Between father and son, south Dublin was represented for seventy-five years.

Although there were never more than 6000 Jews in Ireland, a number had been elected to high office since their arrival in 1079. William Annyas was elected mayor of Youghal, County Cork in 1555. In 1899 Sir Otto Yaffe was Lord Mayor of Belfast. In 1977 Gerald Goldberg became the Lord Mayor of Cork.

The Irish Jews have made a difference in the world, as well. The former president of Israel, Chaim Herzog, was born in Belfast in 1918. He was president from 1983 to 1993. His father Isaac was the first chief rabbi of the Irish Free State.

There was limited Jewish immigration to Ireland during the late 19th century. In 1871 the Jewish population of Ireland was 258, and mainly from Germany or England. There was a wave of new migration in the wake of Russian pogroms, and by 1904 the total Jewish population had reached an estimated 4,800, with the majority living in or around Dublin.

Ireland’s Jews were hyper-patriotic. Many joined the part-time army reserve during the war. A newspaper report in the *Evening Mail* said of a visit to a police station as “I thought that I was in a synagogue”.

Still, Ireland’s treatment of Jews was ambivalent, at best. There was an anti-Semitic boycott in Limerick, known as the Limerick Pogrom, and caused most Jews to leave the city. Fr. John Creagh, an influential Catholic priest, initiated the action. For his efforts, Creagh was assigned to a remote island in the Pacific Ocean. During and after World War Two, the Irish government put up restrictions on who would be allowed into the country, but were seen as being blocks to any Jewish immigration.

Today the number of Jews in Ireland has dwindled to 1800. Of these, 200 live in Northern Ireland and the rest in the Irish Republic.

Robert Briscoe was able to cross over many lines in Irish society. His best friend was Eamon Martin, with whom he served in the IRA, and was a founder of Fianna Eireann. Martin served as Briscoe’s best man. His work amongst all groups moved the Emerald Isle immigration center in New York to name their award for service above and beyond the call the Robert Briscoe award. Robert Briscoe died in 1969. Ben lives in retirement in the Dublin area.

County Donegal, Ireland, native Brendan Loughrey will perform a mix of Irish rebel songs, original compositions, and classic Irish ballads during two concerts on Saturday, Feb. 14, at the Irish Cultural and Heritage Center, 2133 W. Wisconsin Ave., Milwaukee. In honor of Valentine's Day, carnations will be given to women concertgoers at both the 2 p.m. matinee and the 8 p.m. evening shows.

Recognized as one of the finest and most passionate male voices to come out of Ireland in recent years, Loughrey credits Tommy Makem, and Christy Moore as influences. A strong family tradition of music, songs and storytelling provided the foundation for his heart-felt songwriting and compelling performances.

Currently based in Chicago, Loughrey has played many of the major festivals and venues in this country and Ireland and has opened for well-known artists such as Bruce Springsteen and Chuck Berry. He has released five critically acclaimed CDs.

Shamrock Club member Bob Harrold will open at 7 p.m with a performance of the Hallamor's 4000-pipe organ. Harrold is the music director for the Shamrock Club's Mass in March, and is also the music director of the Irish Fest Mass.

Hello everyone. I've decided to take this month off from writing the article. Wish I could say I was sitting on the beach drinking tequila, but alas, I'm at home and thought anyway this next bit would be more enjoyable reading than my normal drive!

This note is from Super Dave Culver about his trip to the Rose Bowl Parade. (Thank you Mary Culver!) Here goes:

“It was the most awesome experience I've ever had. The musicianship of the band was incredible. There were 315 students from 202 high schools across 36 states and to play with these guys was intense. I was only one of about ten sophomores and there were only maybe ten freshman in the group. The rest was made up of junior and seniors in high school and college freshmen.

We practiced for two days and then started performing. This was the first time the band had performed together except for the percussion line. We did a dress rehearsal for our family and fans at UC-Fullerton and then we immediately bussed over to Disneyland to perform in front of 60,000 people at Disney Castle. We then had a chance to hang at Disneyland for a couple hours. That was all on Monday, December 29. Tuesday we set off for band pictures in front of the Rose Bowl stadium and then to perform for Bandfest in Pasadena. Bandfest was a two-day performance of all the bands that would be performing in the TOR parade. It was great to see all the bands do their shows! We also got to see the float being made and were allowed to help put flowers on our Big Bird/Sesame Street float. That was pretty cool and those floats were huge!

The next day we toured LA and Hollywood and got to see Gouman's Chinese Theatre, dove past the La Brea tar pits and kind of saw the Hollywood sign but it was too far away.

January 1st was the parade and we had to be up at 3:30 a.m. to be ready for the buses to leave at 4:30 a.m. California is really cold in the morning! We got to Pasadena and stood around until we stopped off at 11 a.m. The parade was so intense with people screaming and clapping. We marched so fast?almost a run for six miles. Mom said they reported that some floats dove at 45 mph at

some points to catch up. Our adrenaline was pumping so hard I didn't even notice how tired I was until right at the end when a woman held up a "one block to go" sign. I thought WOW, that's it? The screaming fans never stopped and I loved it!

My favorite thing besides the parade was our uniforms. They were so cool that I purchased mine. It's red, white and blue with gauntlets and gloves. The jacket went over white overalls and we had this great hat with a huge white plume. We didn't get to keep the pants or hat. I really wanted the plume!"

Wow, Dave. I can't say it enough, and on behalf of the entire group, we are so *proud* of you. Congratulations on a job well done. We hope that you get more opportunities in the future to travel around the world making music!
