The Taking Of Christ

It was in the summer of 1990 that Father Noel Barber, superior of a small community of Jesuit priests from St. Ignatius Residence in Dublin, decided that since the first floor was being renovated, it was time to have a painting expert look at old paintings in the residence with an eye toward cleaning those that needed it. An acquaintance of Father Barber's, Brian Kennedy, the Assistant Director of the National Gallery of Ireland in Dublin, was invited to look at the paintings, and he brought along Sergio Benedetti, a restorer of paintings and frescoes, who did commissions on the side to supplement his small income from the museum.

Benedetti quickly dismissed all but one of the paintings as rubbish, but that one caused such shock at recognition that he turned away, not daring to believe his eyes. The canvas was dark and grimy and Benedetti wondered when he turned back to look more closely at the work: Is it possible that this is the lost original?

The painting, *The Taking of Christ*, features the figure of Judas, his hand on the shoulder of Christ, soldiers, and an onlooker holding a lantern which is a self-portrait of the artist, Michelangelo da Caravaggio, himself. Between 60 to 80 works of Caravaggio are in existence today.

Benedetti explained to Kennedy and Father Barber that this painting was the best of the lot and he asked casually if he could take it back to the museum for cleaning and restoration. What he suspected would take months to prove and he did not want to raise their hopes until proper provenance had been established.

Caravaggio (1571-1610), widely known for his style of Baroque painting and a dramatic use of lighting on his canvases, is considered one of Europe's greatest painters. He was a scrapper, who strolled the streets of Rome with a sword at his side, itching to fight and too often succeeding. After killing a young man in Rome in 1606, he fled to Naples with a price on his head. A few years

and brawls and journeys later, he was dead at age 38 of what was described simply as fever.

Benedetti brought the painting to the National Gallery where he painstakingly cleaned, restored and studied it, at one point relining it with Irish linen rather than Italian linen with which it was originally lined. This error caused some small cracks to appear in the painting necessitating the relining of the painting with linen ordered from Italy.

Part of proclaiming it a lost Caravaggio would be tracing its history and this was started immediately. What was discovered was that the painting was completed in 1602 for a prominent Italian family and as a consequence its passage through the centuries was amply documented. In 1802, the painting was sold to a Scotsman, and again it was sold at auction in Edinburgh in 1921, at which time its history ended.

When the Jesuits were apprised of what they had in their possession for 70 years, they recalled that the painting had been given to Father Tom Finlay sometime in the 1930s by a woman named Marie Lea-Wilson, who died in 1971 with no heirs.

Having been authenticated as Caravaggio's *The Taking of Christ*, it was decision time for the Jesuits. Whereas their order could surely have used the millions of pounds the picture would fetch, they realized they wanted the picture to remain in Ireland. Their solution: Father Noel Barber with the consent of the Provincial, the head of the Society of Jesus in Ireland, declared that the painting would be placed on indefinite loan to the National Gallery in Dublin.

A condition of the indefinite loan was that any income generated by the sale of reproductions on post cards or as prints or posters would go to the Jesuits. They also asked for and received a full-sized reproduction of the painting to hang on the empty wall space in their parlor on Lower Leeson Street, Dublin.

Old Blind Dogs Return to St. Patrick’s, Loreto Ridge



He’s one phenomenal fiddler – Jonny Hardie is his name – and he’s bringing along three of his friends: a mischievous piper (Ali Hutton), a percussionist with a passion for African instruments (Fraser Stone), and a master of anything with strings (Aaron Jones). Together they’re known as *Old Blind Dogs* and they’re capping off St. Patrick’s annual fall festival with a concert on Sunday, September 20, 2009 at 3:30 p.m.

For the past 17 years this band from Scotland has wowed audiences worldwide. Though the line-up has changed over the years – only Jonny Hardie is a founding band member – one constant has remained: superb musicianship, no compromises allowed. The Dogs have twice earned the title Folk Band of the Year at the prestigious Scots Trad Music Awards (2004 and

2007), and the kudos don't stop there. Aaron Jones garnered Instrumentalist of the Year at the Scots Trad Music Awards (2005); Jonny Hardie tours with *The Chieftains* as their regular guest; Ali Hutton, who has been playing the pipes since he was seven years old, won the National Youth Pipe Band Competition as the pipe major of the Vale of Atholl Pipe Band; and Fraser Stone, a sought after and respected percussion teacher, has developed Trade Afro, a brand of traditional, hand crafted African djembes (more on this later).

So what's in store when this powerhouse of talent returns to Loreto Ridge? Take a clue from their most recent release, *Four on the Floor* (Compass Records, 2007), which was named Best Celtic CD by the Indie Acoustic Project (2007). As one critic observes, a Dogs' CD "bottles the lightning that frequently strikes in concert". (Earle Hitchner, *Irish Echo*, *Wall Street Journal*.) The Dogs last played at St. Patrick's in September 2008. This year, as part of St. Pat's Fall Festival, lightning strikes twice.

Which brings us to the djembe (pronounced "JEM-bay"), a traditional African drum. Percussionist Fraser Stone developed and donated the Trade Afro brand to a community in Senegal where craftsmen build each drum by hand. Trade Afro ensures that the djembes are sold in accordance with fair trade standards. The *Old Blind Dogs* also contribute funding to the Dialaw Music Centre, a music school being built in Senegal. This music school is to serve as a resource for teaching traditional African instruments, music and dance, and provide opportunities for sharing different musical styles and cultures. Dedicated Dog fans know it was a lucky Spring Green area resident who held the winning raffle ticket at the end of the Dogs' September 2008 U.S. tour, taking home the djembe Mr. Stone used throughout that tour. The tour raffle was a fundraiser for the Dialaw Music Centre.

A band of extraordinary musicality. A band whose heart and soul is traditional Celtic with the adventure of African rhythms. A band you don't want to miss? and you won't if you head up to Loreto Ridge on Sunday, September 20 for St. Patrick's Fall Festival. The fun kicks off at 11:30 a.m., featuring a BBQ beef dinner – serving from 11:30-2:30, (the "best meal you ever stood in line for"), with the concert at 3:30 p.m.

St. Patrick's Catholic Church is located in Sauk County at S8280 Hwy. G, where Hwy. G and Hwy. GG intersect (approximately eight miles north of Plain or six miles south of Loganville). Concert ticket prices are \$17 advance and \$20 day of show. Advance concert tickets may be purchased at the following outlets: Plain – Plain Kwik Stop/Shell Gas Station; Reedsburg – DJ Dietz Cabinet Designs & Furniture Restoration; Richland Center – Accents; and Spring Green – Nina's Department & Variety Store. Tickets purchased with a credit card incur an additional processing fee (\$1 per ticket).
